## 2025 Tour de Cure: Chicagoland Returns to St. Charles

Cycling event raises funds to support diabetes research, local programming, and advocacy efforts

**St. Charles, IL. (August 7, 2025)** – The American Diabetes Association® (ADA) is thrilled to host the 2025 Tour de Cure®: Chicagoland at Pottawatomie Park in St. Charles on August 9. This cycling event raises funds so the ADA can fight for all people living with diabetes—one of the fastest growing chronic diseases in the world.

Nationwide, over 38 million people have diabetes, and every 26 seconds, someone new is diagnosed. Approximately 1,209,717 adults in Illinois, or 10.8% of the adult population, have diagnosed diabetes. Every year, an estimated 76,000 of adults in Illinois are diagnosed with diabetes.
